Spaying and Neutering





Spaying



• 5 1/2-6 months of age

Eliminates the heat cycle

 Provides protection from female reproductive diseases such as breast cancer and uterine disease

Will continually be in heat until bred

Neutering



- 5 ½ -6 months of age
- Stops mating drive
- Reduces spraying
- Reduces the urge to roam
- Helps to prevent male genital problems such as prostate cancer

Laser Surgery



- Provides less pain, bleeding and swelling
- Reduces the risk of infection
- Quick return to normal activities

Vaccinations



- The timing of vaccines will depend on your kitten's age and vaccine history
- Vaccinations are important even if you plan for your kitten to be an indoor-only cat
 - Cats can accidentally escape the house
 - Many diseases are transferred through cat bites, scratches, and nose-to-nose contact





Available vaccines:

- Rabies Vaccine
 - Fatal disease that is spread to humans through a single bite from an infected animal
- Distemper Vaccine
 - Highly contagious and potentially fatal disease
- Leukemia Vaccine
 - Shed from cat to cat through saliva and nasal secretions, urine, feces, and milk from infected cats

Feline Leukemia



- Feline leukemia (FeLV) is a virus that results in a moderate to severe suppression of the immune system
- It can be many months or even years between the initial virus infection and the onset of related clinical disease problems
- There is no treatment to eliminate the virus from the body

Feline Leukemia Test



 Our in-house lab work tests for feline heartworm, feline leukemia virus and feline immunodeficiency virus

 Depending on your cat's lifestyle, the doctor may recommend to test yearly

Intestinal Parasites



- Cats can serve as unwilling hosts to tiny organisms that benefit from living in their intestines such as:
 - Roundworms
 - Tapeworms
 - Hookworms
 - Whipworms
 - Coccidia
 - Giardia

Intestinal Parasites



- Your pet can become infected with intestinal parasites by:
 - Nursing from an infected mother
 - Drinking contaminated water
 - Contact with infected feces
 - Ingestion of fleas

This is why it is important to do yearly intestinal parasite screens



Flea, Tick, Heartworm and Intestinal Parasite Products



- Cats can be infected by heartworms from a single mosquito bite
 - There is no cure/treatment for feline heartworm infection
- Heartworm and intestinal parasite protection should be given year round
- Flea and tick preventative should also be given year round
 - Never use a flea and tick preventative that is not labeled for use in cats

AKC Microchip



- The tiny microchip is implanted under the skin
- It contains a one-of-a-kind identification number
- The number is registered in a national database

Nutrition



 If under 12 weeks of age feed 3 meals a day or free feed

After 12 weeks old can feed 2 meals a day

 Be advised to how much to feed to avoid over eating and obesity

Dental Care



 Periodontal disease is not curable but is preventable

80% of cats over 3 years old have periodontal disease

Dental Care



- If left untreated the pet's mouth will become painful
- They will also have bad breath and eventually tooth loss
- Chronic infection in the oral cavity can spread harmful bacteria to the bloodstream and infect all organs of the body



Preventative Dental Care



- Daily tooth brushing is the best way to prevent dental disease
- You must use a toothpaste that is approved to use on cats
- Frey Pet Hospital provides ultrasonic dental cleanings
 - Including digital dental radiographs

Grooming



- If medium or long haired cat, then needs to be brushed daily to avoid matting
- Only bathe when your nose tells you to
- Keep eyes and ears clear of any debris
- Keep nails trimmed to proper length



Positive Reinforcement



- Use something that motivates your kitten like treats, praise and/or toys
- If using treats they should be semi-moist and pea sized
- Rewarding desired behaviors works better than punishing for bad behaviors

Litter Box Care



- One litter box per cat, plus one additional box is recommended in the household
- One box per each level of the house is best
- Change daily if using non-clumping litter
- Scoop out daily and change once a week if using clumping

Problems with "Mouthy" Kittens



- Redirect your pet to something else like it's favorite toy or a fishing pole
- Can yell "OUCH"
- Walk away and let the pet have a "time-out"
- Try bitter apple spray on anything that the kitten is biting/chewing

Socialization



- Have lots of company over with lots of activities
- Can play tapes of storms or turn on the vacuum cleaner and leave it sit
- If your kitten is shy, make sure all experiences are positive



Toys



- Simple toys are best
 - Example: paper bag, wadded up paper, ping-pong ball, cardboard boxes
- Critique toys carefully
 - no eyes, buttons, strings that the cat could chew off

Toys

 Nothing made of string, ribbon, or cording should be left around

 No tinsel at Christmas time, or Easter grass at Easter time

Needle work should be locked up when unattended

Future of FPH Medicine



- Laser Therapy or "Cold" Laser Therapy
 - Can aide in wound healing, pain/trauma, arthritis and more
- Platelet Rich Plasma (PRP)
 - Can aide in the healing of wounds, soft tissue injuries, hip dysplasia and more
- Stem Cell Therapy
 - Stem cells are collected and extracted from the adipose (fat) tissue of your pet
 - The cells can be collected and banked at the time of a spay or neuter
 - Has the ability to help with osteoarthritis, kidney insufficiency, allergies and other compassionate uses
